Workers start in early fall to put up the three million-plus lights and make sure the decorative elves and carolers are in good repair. Recent years have included music by the Riverside Community College Tigers Marching Band and fireworks. The festival has been featured on "Good Morning America" and in USA Today.

The Festival of Lights runs from November 27 to January 3. The Mission Inn is located at 3649 Mission Inn Ave., Riverside, An ice skating rink, located on the Main Street Pedestrian Mall between University and Mission Inn avenues, will be open from November 27 to December 18 from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday, from 4 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Friday, noon to 11 p.m. on Saturday and noon to 10 p.m. on Sunday, Starting December 19 the ice rink hours will be noon to 11 p.m. daily. Cost is \$13 per hour which includes skate rental.


In addition, Santa will be in downtown Riverside every night from Nov. 27 to Dec. 24 and he's available for breakfast, too.

I have heard rumors that Al Capone lived in Fontana on Tamarind Avenue. Is it true?

Though the large, Spanish-style home on Tamarind Avenue was never owned by Al Capone, longtime Fontana residents claim he lived there off and on throughout his years as a Chicago mob boss. Once surrounded by vineyards and groves, it would have been one of many houses across the country Capone inhabited during Prohibition. Like the others, the Tamarind Avenue house doesn't look like anything special from the outside, but has its fair share of peculiarities and mysteries inside.



For example, some of the closets have secret windows and can be accessed from other closets via passageways in the house's abnormally thick and hollow walls. Every room on the ground floor has access to the yard, and the second chimney projecting from the center of the house has no fireplace underneath it, only a hollow wall. A painting of an unidentified woman has also generated curiosity. The proximity to the railroad tracks supports the local myth that Capone used the house as an out-of-the-way hideout on trips to Los Angeles, perhaps as a stop-off from the exclusive Desert Hot Springs party resort that Capone established with his girlfriend, silent movie star Gladys Walton. The resort was frequented by Hollywood's elite, according to Walton's son, John. He has given tours at Two Bunch Palms (now a 45-room spa resort), sharing stories about his mother and Capone. As for the Fontana house, it has now passed on to other private owners, and renovations have removed some of the secret passageways, but the large C adorning the working chimney still garners attention and questions.
