THE 8th Latin American Festival is taking on the flavour of Rio to mark the 2016 - Olympics, which will be held in the Brazilian city in August.

"We may even have some qualifying for golf, one of the two sports that will be featured for the first time in the Olympics, the other is Rugby Sevens," said Tunku Imran.
