Welcome to our alpine paradise of adventure & exploration. From its humble beginnings as a railway town and then a mining town in the late 1800s to today, Canmore has become a mecca of outdoor adventure and relaxation.

Fall in the Bow Valley is full of change, from the colours of the larch trees to the progression of the temperatures from hot to cold, September brings us the Highland Games where you can embrace your inner Scot with kilts, whiskey, and bagpipes. We also welcome the 2SLGBTQ+ communities of Canmore and Banff for pride festivals in September and October with various events happening in both communities. As winter slowly approaches, the Bow Valley becomes a winter enthusiast's dream! November marks the start of the ski and snowboard season as the upper alpine transitions into a winter paradise.

WHAT TO WEAR

Mornings and nights call for cold weather clothing and winter jackets. Day time can bring any type of climate. The trick to being comfortable outdoors is to dress in layers with a t-shirt, sweater, shorts, hiking pants, and a wind/waterproof jacket. Wear proper footwear for hiking and exploring such as flat-soled shoes or boots. Sunglasses are recommended and don't forget to pack a bottle of water, light snacks, and your camera.

Do not let lack of proper gear hinder you from fully experiencing the Canadian Rockies. Canmore has many stores and rental shops to help you get outdoors in comfort.

BIOSPHERE INSTITUTE OF THE BOW VALLEY

WildSmart is a proactive conservation program that encourages efforts by Bow Valley communities to reduce negative human-wildlife interactions. The Bow Valley is home to over 25,000 people. It is also a major movement corridor for grizzly bears, black bears, cougars, wolves, elk, coyotes, and other large mammals.

The Biosphere Institute implements WildSmart in close collaboration with Alberta Environment and Parks, the Town of Canmore, and the Municipal District of Bighorn.

Limited bear spray is available to borrow upon request at the concierge desk. Please note that guests must be over 18 to borrow bear spray and will be required to sign a waiver of liability.

Golfing

Most golf courses in the Bow Valley close after Canadian Thanksgiving long weekend in October.

CANMORE GOLF & CURLING CLUB

Play where the locals play! Canmore Golf and Curling Club boasts a Par 71, 6,460-yard course nestled in the heart of Canmore. The surrounding mountains of the Bow Valley make this the perfect golf getaway location. Are you just looking to practice your swing? Not a problem! Canmore Golf and Curling Club has a driving range just a few steps away from the clubhouse to be used by members and visitors alike.

SILVERTIP GOLF COURSE

Silvertip Golf Course is located right within the town of Canmore and includes a full 18-hole course with a par 72 spanning 6,473 yards and a total of 600 feet of elevation change. The design of the course makes for a challenging round for all skill levels. Silvertip is the only golf resort in town that faces south. This leads to longer, warmer days on the green with extended patio time in the clubhouse during the evening.

STEWART CREEK COURSE

Stewart Creek offers a world class Par 71 and a total of 6,638 yards over an 18-hole course. Stewart Creek is consistently rated one of the best courses in the country. With immaculate views of the Three Sisters, Cascade, Pigeon, and Ha Ling Mountains, it is easy to see why. Very few golf courses in North America have such a serene setting with pristine views coupled with world class golf! This is one golf experience you will not soon forget.

BREWSTER'S KANANASKIS GOLF COURSE

Brewster's Kananaskis Golf Course offers a unique 18-hole, Par 72 course that lies at the base of Mount Yamnuska. Spanning 5,606 yards, this course winds through rugged tree lined terrain and landscapes that challenge all skill levels. The course has been designed to reward accuracy off the tee and you can choose whether to capitalize on many risk reward sections of the course as well.

KANANASKIS GOLF COURSE

Kananaskis Golf Course offers a challenging Par 72 course spanning 7,136 yards. With immaculately lush fairways, bent grass greens and over 120 bunkers, this course offers something for everyone from beginner to Pro! The course itself is surrounded by glacier-fed creeks and ponds with stunning views of the Kananaskis River.

FAIRMONT BANFF SPRINGS GOLF COURSE

Fairmont Banff Springs Golf Course offers a very challenging Par 71 course design. Located right in the heart of the Banff Townsite, amateurs and professionals the world over are continually captivated and amazed by this world renowned golf course year after year.

YEAR ROUND GOLF SIMULATOR



A Kananaskis Conservation Pass is required to use the Nordic Centre facility. There is no additional charge to use the frisbee golf course. The course operates on a first come, first served basis.

Autumn Hikes

CHESTER LAKE 9.3 kms round trip | 433m of elevation gain | 3-4 hours round trip A Kananaskis Conservation Pass will be required to access the trailhead. You will hike gradual but steady switchbacks. The trail will open up to an expansive meadow with breathtaking panoramic mountain vistas. You will re-enter the forest and come out at Chester Lake. The trail is listed as moderate difficulty.

BOW GLACIER FALLS 8.9 kms round trip | 282m of elevation gain | 2-3 hours round trip A National Parks Pass will be required to access the trailhead. The trail starts at Bow Lake. The hike follows the Bow River. The trail is fairly easy going until you are closer to the falls themselves. You will need to be mindful of tree roots and loose rock on the trail.

KARST SPRINGS 9.2 kms round trip | 308m of elevation gain | 3-4 hours round trip A Kananaskis Conservation Pass will be required to access the trailhead. The route is very well maintained and marked. If you are looking to get away from crowds, this is the trail for you! Every step of the way, you will be treated to some of the best scenery the Spray Valley has to offer. The trail is listed as moderate but much of the elevation is gained gradually.

TROLL FALLS 3.4 kms round trip | 154m of elevation gain | 1-2 hours round trip A Kananaskis Conservation Pass will be required to access the trailhead. The trail is usually very busy and well-travelled. There are two waterfalls that you can visit. Most of the elevation you gain is going up to the Upper Falls. Ice cleats may be useful in the early spring to reach the Upper Falls.

PRAIRIE VIEW TRAILS 10.8 kms round trip | 509m of elevation gain | 4-5 hours round trip A Kananaskis Conservation Pass will be required to access the trailhead. The trail starts at Barrier Lake Day Use area. An earlier start to your day is highly recommended as this day use area is quite popular. You will walk across the Barrier Dam and pick up a well-marked trail from there. You can expect several gradual switchbacks through the forest. You will be rewarded with amazing views of Barrier Lake and surrounding areas below you.

The Bow Valley is within the Treaty Seven Nations, Blackfoot Confederacy which include: Kainai, Piikani and Siksika Nation and Stoney Nakoda which include: Goodstoney, Bearspaw and Chiniki First Nation and Tsuu T'ina Nation and Metis Nation region #3.

Step into a world where ancient traditions and vibrant cultures come to life. Indigenous Tourism is for anyone who seeks immersive history, and cultural and deep connections with nature. You can explore the unique Indigenous culture and some of the most beautiful sceneries ranging from the foothills, to the towering peaks of the mountain, to crystal blue lakes and awe-inspiring waterfalls with the stories and traditions of these remarkable peoples as you embark on an unforgettable adventure that spans generations. Join us in celebrating the rich tapestry of Alberta's Indigenous cultures.

GUIDED INDIGENOUS DAY HIKE TOURS

Connect with Mother Nature and learn about Indigenous culture and traditions on guided hikes throughout Kananaskis Country. Our day hikes are filled with amazing stories accented with knowledge holders from the Treaty Seven territory. From drummers to dancers and traditional storytellers, we have you covered with learning the beauty of our Indigenous culture.

INDIGE-SCAPE INSPIRED HELI TOURS

Soar over the Canadian Rockies and learn about the Indigenous names of local lakes and mountain peaks such as Spirit Water, which is the name given to Lake Minnewanka (MĨNĨ WAKÃ) by the Stoney Nakoda people because it was a sacred and spiritual area. Indigenous people long inhabited areas around Spirit Water, dating back over 10,000 years.



Early Season Downhill Sports

Like most outdoor activities, Mother Nature decides the opening day of ski resorts. However, resorts are set to open end of October to mid-November (weather dependent).

NAKISKA

Nakiska Ski Area is located at the heart of Kananaskis Country. The resort was built from the ground up for the 1988 Calgary Olympic Games' alpine events. These days, Nakiska is a family favourite, especially with the addition of a tube park to the base area of the resort.

SUNSHINE VILLAGE SKI RESORT

Banff Sunshine Village is the premier place to ski and ride in the Canadian Rockies. The resort, voted Banff National Park's favourite resort by locals five years in row, is loved for its extended ski and snowboard season. In a typical year, Sunshine receives an average of 30 feet of dry powder and skiers of Banff Sunshine can carve up slopes from early November to late May. With over 3,500 acres of wild mountain terrain spread across three mountains of diverse slopes perfect for skiers and riders of all levels, it's easy to see why Sunshine Village is home of Canada's Best Snow.

MOUNT NORQUAY

From the legendary ski racers that have claimed their glory on these slopes since the 1930s, to beginners clipping on skis for the very first time, Norquay's for everyone. To ski or ride Norquay is to do it completely on your terms. This is a high-action mountain with zero pressure. Ski lines on our steeper terrain, take it easy on our gentle, undulating groomers and perfectly groomed beginner runs, or test your tricks-status on our terrain park.

LAKE LOUISE

You will immediately see why winter enthusiasts return here season after season. Our terrain, which has earned Lake Louise a coveted place on skiers' bucket-lists the world over, just speaks for itself.

To be in this place is to be at one with the stirring nature that surrounds. From the black diamond rip to the gentle green stroll, get ready for the fun and freedom of exploring endless chutes, glades, and gullies in the heart of natural perfection. Choose your own downhill destiny; our mountain has endless options.

SUSPENSION BRIDGES

Pair your scenic drive with a high-altitude suspension bridge walk! Put your fears to the test with a knee-shaking adventure. Create incredible memories and capture stunning photographs while high above canyon walls. Do you dare cross some of the highest suspension bridges in the area?

GONDOLA

Are you tired of seeing the mountains from below the tree line? Experience the Rockies like never before with one of the many gondolas in the Bow Valley. With 360-degree views and reaching heights of 2000m, these excursions will get you up close and personal with the most famous mountains in the area. Enjoy the finest of dining from the top of the world. Join a guided hike at the top and see bears and other wildlife in the natural habitats.

ICE FIELDS AND SKY WALK

Take a journey back in time by visiting a sheet of ice that is over 10,000 years old. The story of the Athabasca Valley is ever evolving and has quite the story to tell. Take a 30-minute journey out onto the glacier in an All-Terrain Explorer. Along the way, your guide will give you a fascinating glimpse of the glacier's history.

Afterwards, you will head out to the glass-floored Skywalk. You will have unobstructed views right off the cliff's edge!

HELI TOURS

Heli tours offer the most spectacular sightseeing tours in the heart of the Canadian Rocky Mountains. Fly around the iconic Three Sisters Mountain, Mt. Assiniboine, or marvel at Marvel Pass - these flights are sure to leave an impression.

Venture Under the Mountains

HOT SPRINGS

Sooth your aching muscles in a Hot Spring that consists of 100% natural mineral water. The water temperatures are generally around 37 to 40 °C (98 to 104 °F). The Hot Springs operate on a first come first serve basis. No reservations or pre-booking is available. The last admission into the Hot Springs is 30 minutes before closing time.

HEART CREEK BUNKER - THE VAULT

There has been much speculation around the Heart Creek Bunker and its real purpose. Many have theorized that the bunker was to be used as an emergency fallout shelter in case of a nuclear war. Others have theorized it was nothing more than the start of a mine shaft. Truth be told, all theories and rumors are incorrect!

The bunker was created by Joe and Stan Rokosh. The two brothers deemed it a good idea to create a Mountain Vault intended to house valuable government documents and other important items during the peak of the Cold War.

Do you want to see the bunker with your own eyes? The hike is 4 kilometers one way with a total of 212 meters of elevation gain. Please allow 1 to 2 hours to get to the bunker. Don't forget to bring a flashlight!


CAVING IN CANMORE

Find the hidden side of Canmore with the best in the Rockies. Canmore's trusted cave guiding company has been offering tours at Rat's Nest Cave since 1992. The water sculpted passages of the cave offer seemingly endless opportunities to explore. This is not the typical tourist cave that comes with handrails and well-built walkways of wood. You will be crawling, climbing, shimmying, sliding, and repelling. You will get dirty! Protective equipment is provided by the operator and they will advise on items you need to bring. This is family friendly with children 10+.

UNDERGROUND HOT SPRINGS OF BANFF

Welcome to the birthplace of the national park system in Canada. The Cave and Basin was discovered in 1883 by three railway workers which sparked a series of events that led to the creation of Canada's first national park we call Banff. Learn the ten-thousand-year history of this cave and why it is so special to Indigenous Peoples. Participate in a family friendly game of mini curling or join in on interpretive workshops.

Lakes, Rivers & Waterfall Excursions

MORAINE LAKE AND LAKE LOUISE TOURS

Changes have been made to the accessibility to Banff National Park's most visited destination, Moraine Lake. Restrictions have been implemented and Moraine Lake is no longer open to personal vehicles. Planning in advance is key to avoiding disappointment and to maximize your time at these bucket list destinations. Tours and shuttles are available.

Please be advised that the projected closing date for Moraine Lake is October 9th.

BOAT CRUISE

Set sail on some of the freshest water Alberta has to offer! Enjoy lots of fresh air as you cruise around open waters with unobstructed mountain vistas. Your Captain and Crew will regale you with tall tales of the area on your journey. Keep your eyes peeled for wildlife along the shoreline. With a little bit of luck, coyotes, elk or even bears can be spotted. Bon Voyage!

CANOE AND KAYAKING RENTALS

This activity is on many people's "To-Do" list. Getting out on clear blue glacier fed lakes surrounded by the peaks of the Rockies is an experience not to miss. The Bow Valley and Kananaskis Country offer many different opportunities for getting out on the lakes. You can choose to rent a canoe and kayak to launch yourself at your favorite paddling spot. Or go to the boat docks to get paddle time starting from 30min to a half day. Most rental companies operate on a first come first serve basis.

CANYONING

Canyoning in the Bow Valley is a rush! Let a local guide navigate you through deep mountain gorges and down fast-flowing mountain streams using a variety of techniques including abseiling, climbing, sliding, and jumping. Depending on how adventurous you are feeling, on average you will have 4 or 5 rappels! Making this one adventure you will not soon forget!

Soft Adrenaline Adventures

ATV & SXS TOURS

Embark on a fun-filled expedition through the mountains with a guided ATV and SXS tour. Whether it's your first time or you grew up in the sport, this is suitable for all skill levels. Our trusted tour operator will be happy to get you off the road and on to the dirt. Get a taste of the valley in either an SXS (side by side) or an ATV.

Toby Creek's last tour is on October 9th. They offer "Larches in Paradise" from September 19th - October 9th. Experience the incredible golden larches with a unique ATV & SXS tour through a spectacular vibrant larch forest.


E-BIKE TOURS

This must-do activity in Canmore and Banff offers different tour options to suit your interest. Spooky Mysteries & Story Telling

BUFFALO NATIONS MUSEUM

In a distinct log fortress on the banks of the Bow River, wonder at the animation and pageantry of the traditional and contemporary lives of the Indigenous Peoples of Canada. Enhance your experience through innovative technology and share your own cultural identity with their interpreter. Browse the gift shop or pause for a complimentary hot beverage in the reading area. Buffalo Nations Museum serves as a hub for Indigenous Canadians using traditional knowledge to conserve and restore language, culture, and ecology.

ABANDONED TOWNS AND COAL MINES

Canmore and the Bow Valley have a rich coal mining history. Canmore, in particular, has thrived since the 1988 Winter Olympic Games were hosted in Calgary. Since then, Canmore has more than tripled its population. Canmore and the Bow Valley is left with past reminders of the coal mining history scattered throughout the area.

ESCAPE ROOMS

The Bow Valley proudly offers escape room styles of adventures! There are two styles available. Go at your own pace, or choose to race against the clock to complete your objective. Each type of adventure will offer a completely different experience. Both styles of adventure will require your team to utilize different skills to complete your task at hand. Both are great options for team building and are also family friendly.

GHOST WALKS

Come learn about the paranormal side of the Bow Valley. Experience the natural beauty of both Canmore and Banff townsites while hearing chilling tales of the area. From ghost towns to haunted hotels, the Bow Valley is full of things that go 'bump' in the night.

HISTORICAL STORY TELLING

NWMP Barracks

This historic Canmore building was built in the late 19th Century. The Northwest Mounted Police Barracks is one of three surviving buildings built before the creation of Alberta in 1905.

Canmore Museum

The Canmore Museum offers a unique perspective of the town's rich history. The museum's exhibits are constantly rotating in keeping with the events that are held within the townsite and immediate surrounding area.

Avoid disappointment in viewing popular high congestion locations such as Moraine Lake, Lake Louise, Johnston Canyon, Peyto Lake and more, by booking a guided group or private tour.

STARGAZING TOUR

Enjoy the sights and sounds of a mountain landscape after the sun has gone down and be dazzled by a sky full of more stars than you can possibly imagine. Join our skilled interpreter on a 5km walk through a forest and be awed by the incredible vastness of the Milky Way before your eyes. Along the trail you can look out for nocturnal wildlife that you might otherwise miss, and experience Banff National Park in a new way.

SURVIVAL HIKES

Join our guide on a leisurely 5km hike through a beautiful forest. Along the way, learn about the wildlife, analyze animal tracks along the trail, and learn what to do should you encounter a bear. Feel like one of the original explorers of the wild west as you sip tea made from local plants. Your guide will show you a wide variety of wild edibles along the trail. Stop at beautiful viewpoints where you will learn to start a fire without a lighter. Using materials collected along the way, be challenged to build a shelter using basic emergency supplies and learn what to look for if you ever need to survive in the backcountry.

HISTORY WALKING TOURS

If you're an explorer at heart, this is the perfect tour for you! Join our local and knowledgeable guides on an immersive historical walking tour of Canmore or Banff. Discover the history of both towns and the hardy pioneers, cowboys, miners, and early explorers who built the communities. Visit hidden gems and listen to untold stories, get to know about the wildlife by learning mountain survival, basic tracking, examine wild plants, and listen to local secrets. There are chances of spotting wildlife and enjoying picturesque scenery of our town while exploring along one of our many hiking trails. Experiences and walking/hiking trails vary.

HIGHLIGHTS SIGHTSEEING TOURS





YAMNUSKA WOLFDOG SANCTUARY

East towards Calgary, Yamnuska Wolfdog Sanctuary is open year round and is a family friendly centre. The Sanctuary walk is perfect for those 6 years and older. This self-guided walk through the Sanctuary allows visitors to see the ground and view the various packs of wolfdogs at their own pace. This is a great opportunity to learn interesting facts about wolfdogs and wolves.

For something more interactive, in addition to the sanctuary walk, go on a tour that provides an up-close hands-on experience with the wolfdogs. This experience must be booked in advance and is available to those 15 years of age and older.

Scenic Drives - Canmore, Kananaskis

SPRAY LAKES VALLEY LOOP

This drive is for the adventurous soul. This drive is best for high clearance vehicles such as pickup trucks, Jeeps, or SUVs. Before heading out, please visit the hotel concierge for maps and updated road conditions. The drive can be treacherous at times and is periodically closed for avalanche control. The drive starts on Spray Lakes Road (just past the Nordic Centre). After the Grassi Lakes trailhead, the road becomes unpaved and often unmaintained. Drive carefully as the road starts to climb up past the tree line on the shoulder of Mount Rundle, and back down to the backside of Mount Lawrence Grassi. Follow this gravel road until you reach the junction for Peter Lougheed Provincial Park and then turn left. You then take a second left onto Hwy 40. Keep driving until the Hwy 1 (Trans Canada) exit and head west back to Canmore. Highlights include Quarry Lake, Grassi Lakes, Whitemans Pond, Spray Lakes Day Use Area, Mt. Shark Day Use Area, and Chester Lake.

KANANASKIS HIGHWAY Hwy 40 South to Upper Kananaskis Lakes

This is for the laid-back driver looking for views along a smooth and easy day drive. From Canmore head east on the Hwy 1 (Trans Canada) and turn South onto Hwy 40 (Kananaskis Highway). This is the same turn-off as the Casino (easiest landmark to spot). This is where the drive gets very scenic. Be on the lookout for wildlife as well. Deer, elk, goats and bears can frequently be spotted along the highway (there is no guarantee of seeing them however). The road continues to wind to both Lower and Upper Kananaskis Lakes. Highlights include Barrier Lake Day Use Area, Kananaskis Village, Boundary Ranch, Fortress Junction, Peter Lougheed Park Discovery Centre, and the Kananaskis Lakes.

Scenic Drives - Banff & Beyond

THE BOW VALLEY PARKWAY Highway 1A

This is a scenic drive between Exshaw and Lake Louise on highway 1A with multiple breaks and many points of interest along the way. Highlights include Grotto Canyon where you will find rock climbers and an Inukshuk rock garden, Johnston Canyon, the memorial in honour of Ukrainian internees, and the scenery of poplar forests, peaceful meadows, and the Bow River. It will add an additional 2 hours from South of Canmore to Lake Louise, but it is a much more beautiful drive than the main highway. Be cautious when driving this road early in the morning or at dusk as there is a higher possibility of wildlife being present on, and next to, the road.

Parks Canada has launched a three-year cycling pilot program along the Bow Valley Parkway's eastern section. The parkway will be closed to motor vehicle access from May 1 to June 25 and August 30 to September 30. If you would like to participate in biking this spectacular mountain road, contact the concierge team for more information.

THE ICEFIELDS PARKWAY Highway 93 North

Year after year, this drive ranks near the top of the list of Most Scenic Highways in the world as voted by National Geographic. It winds beside peaceful lakes and rushing rivers overlooking snow-capped mountain peaks and majestic glaciers. Points of interest include the Columbia Icefields Centre, Bow Lake, Peyto Lake, Mistaya Canyon, Sunwapta Falls, Athabasca Falls and many more! Along the way keep an eye out for wildlife including elk, mountain goats and bears.

HIGHWAY 1 WEST & YOHO NATIONAL PARK

In the beautiful province of British Columbia just west of us lies the rugged and untouched beauty of Yoho National Park. Accessible by Highway 1 West, Yoho is home to the rich-green coloured Emerald Lake, the natural rock formations of the Natural Bridge, and the incredible power of Takakkaw and Wapta Falls. This is a great option for a full-day outing.

HIGHWAY 93 SOUTH AND KOOTENAY NATIONAL PARK

A popular wildlife corridor, Highway 93 South leads you to the unique Kootenay National Park. One of the worst fires in the Rockies' history ravaged through this area in 2003 but there's proof that beauty can come from ashes as the scenery is now a photographer's paradise with charred wood juxtaposes, vibrant green vegetation, and glorious blue waters. Points of interest include Stanley Glacier, Marble Canyon, and further south the town of Radium's famous hot springs. Its hot mineral water is odorless and clear, perfect for a relaxing soak. Kids will enjoy swimming and diving in the cooler swimming pool (27°C). Visit south-eastern British Columbia's largest day spa in Radium. See if you can spot one of the bighorn sheep that make this canyon home.
