# SAGRADA FAMILIA

Conceived by Antoni Gaudí in 1882 and still unfinished, it is a masterpiece that blends Modernist architecture with religious symbolism.

It stands out for its innovative design and ongoing construction, more than a century after its inception. Gaudí integrated symbols of nature into every detail of the church, such as the façades representing the Nativity and the Passion, both filled with organic shapes that mimic flora and fauna.

He designed the building with the intention that natural light would be a fundamental part of the spiritual experience — a goal achieved through the stained glass windows, which play a key role in the temple's atmosphere, changing with the time of day.

Like a star in the midst of formation, the Sagrada Família is the beating heart of our urban constellation.

It is a testament to the passage of time, a reflection of how great creations—like celestial bodies—take centuries to reach their full splendor. Its towers rise toward the sky, connecting earth with the cosmos and radiating energy over the city.

From Azimuth, the Sagrada Família is more than an architectural icon; it is a guiding star, a point of light that inspires our way of seeing Barcelona.







# TIBIDABO

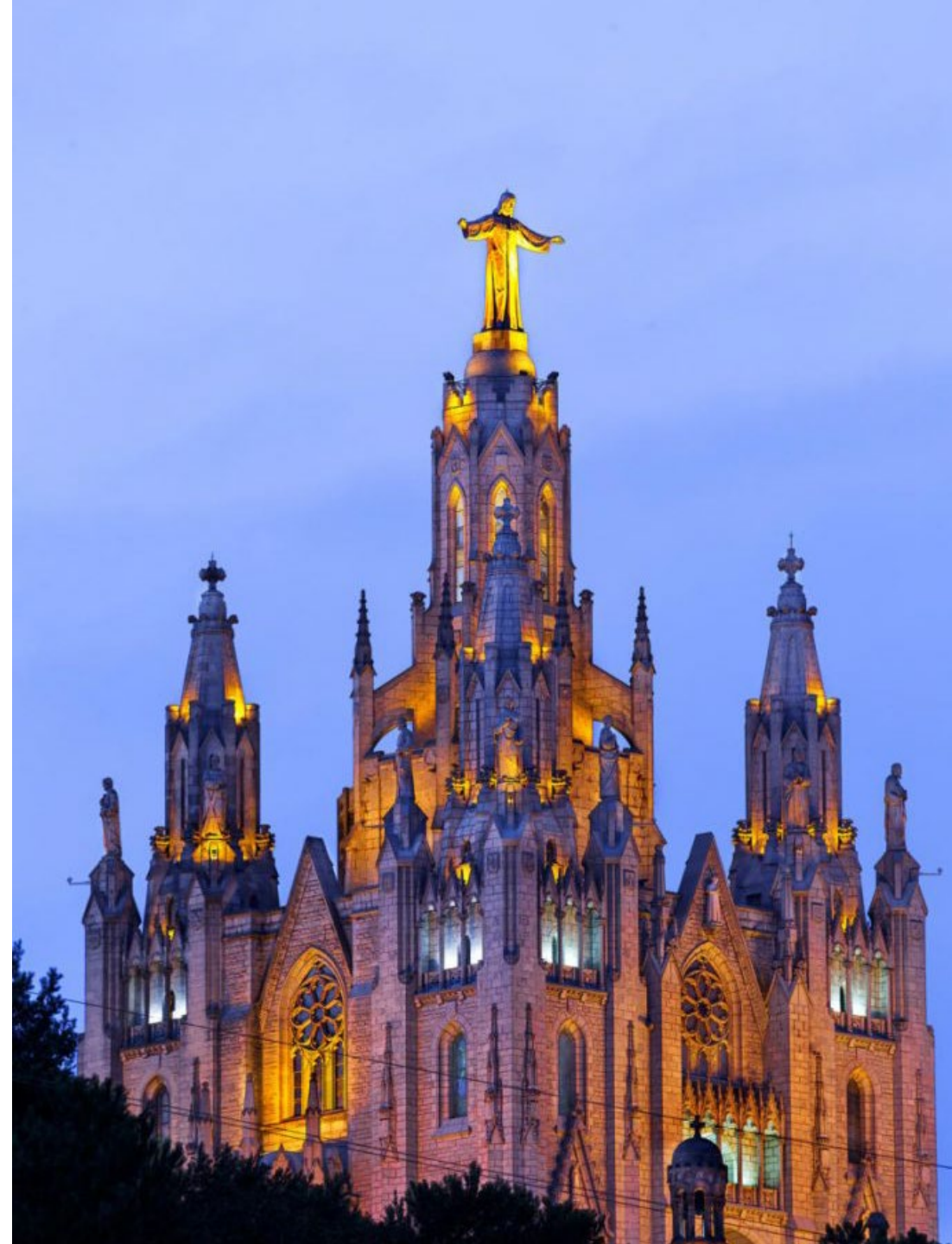
Tibidabo is an iconic mountain in Barcelona, renowned both for its breathtaking panoramic views of the city and for being home to the Temple of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, a neo-Gothic church that stands at the mountain's summit.

Its construction began in 1902 under the design of architect Enric Sagnier and was completed in 1961. In addition to its religious and natural value, the building carries deep symbolism, as it was conceived as a place of penance and atonement.

At its peak is the Tibidabo Amusement Park, inaugurated in 1901, making it one of the oldest amusement parks in Spain.

At 512 meters above sea level, it is the highest point in our urban constellation. Its name, derived from the Latin *tibi dabo* ("I will give you"), evokes celestial promises, as if from its summit we could reach the universe.

Tibidabo represents a balance between the spiritual and the playful, the earthly and the ethereal. From Azimuth, this majestic star aligns with our perspective, connecting the sky with the city and reminding us that there is always a new height to discover.







# ROCAMORA HOUSE

With their Neo-Gothic and Modernist silhouette, the Rocamora Houses are an architectural ensemble that lights up the heart of Passeig de Gràcia. Built between 1914 and 1917 by architect Bonaventura Bassegoda i Amigó, these six residences have borne witness to the splendor of early 20th-century bourgeois Barcelona.

Their façade, adorned with pointed towers, wrought-iron balconies, and delicate sgraffiti, resembles stars shimmering within a harmonious constellation. Located on one of the city's most iconic avenues, they blend into the Modernist firmament alongside gems like Casa Batlló and La Pedrera.



Their stately character and meticulous ornamentation make them a landmark in Barcelona's skyline, bringing balance and symmetry to our urban constellation.

From Azimuth, the Rocamora Houses represent the art and sophistication of Modernism — a double star that shines with its own light over Passeig de Gràcia.

To observe them from our rooftop is to rediscover the essence of a golden era, a reminder that Barcelona's architectural beauty is as infinite as the universe.







# BARCELONA CATHEDRAL

Barcelona Cathedral, with its majestic Gothic architecture, is another of the icons that defines the city's skyline.

Located in the heart of the Gothic Quarter, its construction began in the 13th century and spanned several centuries, which is reflected in the mix of Gothic styles and Renaissance elements in its interior.

It stands out for its imposing façade, stained glass windows, and cloister, which houses a small garden. In its crypt lies the tomb of Saint Eulalia, one of Barcelona's patron saints.

The cathedral, which has witnessed centuries of change in the city, becomes a spiritual and cultural landmark.

Its imposing structure, visible from various points around the city, rises toward the sky like a star, distinguished both by its history and its architectural magnificence.

From Azimuth, the Cathedral is revealed not only as a Gothic masterpiece, but as a celestial body whose light illuminates the soul of Barcelona..







# UNIÓN Y EL FÉNIX BUILDING

Located in the center of Barcelona, it is an example of Modernist architecture, designed by architect Josep Domènech i Estapà in 1904.

This building stands out for its elegant eclectic façade, featuring elements of medieval and Renaissance architecture, as well as its rich wrought-iron and glazed ceramic ornamentation. It was originally the headquarters of the insurance company Unión y el Fénix, symbolizing the city's economic boom in the early 20th century.

In addition to its architectural beauty, one of its most distinctive features is the sculpture on its roof depicting a female figure, alluding to the personification of the insurance company.

Its Neoclassical architecture, with details that evoke grandeur and elegance, becomes a key star in our urban constellation.

La Unión y el Fénix symbolizes the connection between the past and the present, a landmark that offers a unique perspective of the city and its evolution.

Its historic façade and strategic location allow us, from the rooftop, to observe how the building reflects the sunlight, like a celestial body shining brightly, reminding us that the history of Barcelona is always alive and projecting into the future.
