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

he 2024 edition of the Chapman's Challenge at Pangkor Laut Resort welcomed back the Chapman family and featured a special appearance by Andrew Reid, from the renowned Australian series Bondi Rescue. 

Ritz-Carlton, Koh Samui. Jedrek wasn't too far behind with a recorded time of one hour and 11 minutes, and went home with the same prizes.

### A SECOND CHANCE FOR THE MARINE LIVES

The Nature Conservation Centre, an initiative by YTL Hotels, oversees the livelihood of marine animals around Pangkor Laut. Headed by Justin Juhun and his team of marine biologists, the centre nursed three Hawksbill sea turtles back to health for release as part of the event. "We are always looking out for marine animals that need our medical help," said Juhun, who is determined to prevent sea turtles from facing extinction.

# YOU CAN BANK ON IT AT THE THREADNEEDLES HOTEL

BE SQUARE-MILE SAVVY AND INVEST IN A STAY HERE FOR YOUR NEXT LONDON HOLIDAY.

f the Bank of England is nicknamed 'the old lady of Threadneedles', then the elegant Threadneedles Hotel in the City of London is the charming rake who chats her up any chance he gets. This Autograph Collection property is a well-kept secret that seasoned travellers to London keep close to their chests. It is strategically located in the Square Mile, which plays a part in the city's 800 years of imperial wealth, financial scandals and audacious frauds, and is still the heartbeat of banking power today. Threadneedles Hotel's provenance also has links to the Merchant Taylors' Guild, one of the 12 great livery companies of the City of London from the Middle Ages.

This Classical building of Portland stone was built in 1856 for The City Bank branch in London, and a reminder of this can still be seen in two places in the hotel today: the logo on the stained-glass dome over the spacious lobby and the ornate stone crest of The City Bank above the unusual circular front doors of the former Victorian bank.

The famous glass-domed lobby adjacent to the hotel bar is a great place to meet up with friends, have a pre-dinner aperitif or impress a client. The lobby has been re-fitted with floor-to-ceiling bookshelves and leather sofas to give the space the grand but intimate atmosphere of a successful Victorian bank. Opposite the hotel lifts is a History Board with black-and-white photographs from the London Picture



Archive that shows how the 19th-century bank tellers' counters were arranged in a row underneath the glass dome. The board also recounts the story of an American conman, Austin Bidwell, and his four accomplices, who got rich by selling fake Bank of England bills of exchange until they were caught and arrested in 1873. The gang of fraudsters were aptly called the Thieves of Threadneedles Street.

There is a lot to recommend staying in possibly the richest square mile in the world. It is populated during the working week with financiers and lawyers, and buzzing with the pulse of global finance. In addition, the five-star property offers an accessible guest room on the ground floor with a separate ramped entrance. And if this sort of trivia interests you, this guest room is just around the corner from the former Victorian vault of The City Bank. Spread across different floors and wings are eight luxury suites, each named after famous explorers such as Ernest Shackleton, David Livingstone and Edmund Hillary, and come complete with a little information about each of them and their adventures in the suites.













### **SPARE CHANGE ANYONE?**

A five-minute walk from Threadneedles Hotel is the narrow and winding Change Alley, which, in the 1700s, housed the first London stock market. It's impressive, but true, that London already had an active stock market 300 years ago; but it didn't trade under the roof of a grand establishment. Shares were traded, believe it or not, in a handful of London alleyways like Change Alley and coffeehouses. This was because stockjobbers, who acted as dealers for stocks, were judged to be too rude and rowdy for the Royal Exchange.



Change Alley (sometimes referred to as Exchange Alley EC3) was also home to a number of coffeehouses where stock prices were posted and where traders bought and sold their shares. Today, there is still a plaque to mark the location of one of the more famous ones, Garraway's Coffee-House. This coffee establishment was opened by a bookshop owner called Thomas Guy, who grew so wealthy from his stocks and shares that he also built Guy's Hospital, which still stands today near London Bridge.



The entire fifth floor can be booked as a Penthouse accommodation, offering you the privilege of private lift access, two Deluxe Rooms, two Suites, and a full-length balcony on which to enjoy pre-dinner drinks at sunset. The Penthouse has a spectacular view of the London skyline of buildings, ranging from 17th-century Christopher Wren churches to 21st-century skyscrapers that locals affectionately call the 'Gherkin' and the 'Walkie-Talkie'.

The hotel's location is right in the heady mix of the Royal Exchange and the Bank of England, as well as former offices of the East India Company. You'll have no doubt that you're staying in what was once the heart of Empire. In fact, some of the guest rooms in the Executive category were once the offices of The City Bank's senior executives, and have grand features such as heavy-panelled mahogany doors and marble fireplaces. Some of the Executive Rooms have floor-to-ceiling windows, while others are smaller, with views over pretty Finch Lane that run between Threadneedle Street and Cornhill, home of luxury boutiques and specialty coffee bars.

The hotel is an ideal base for shopping, as the Royal Exchange nearby is home to many luxury brands, while the historic Leadenhall (film location of Diagon Alley in the Harry Potter movie franchise) and Spitalfields markets are a pleasant 20-minute stroll away.



# ARIAS IN PARADISE

THE SECOND EDITION OF OPERA IN PARADISE INTRODUCES A HOST OF NEW NAMES AND RETURNING FAVOURITE ANDREA GRIMINELLI.

rom 18 to 20 October 2024, the hotly anticipated Opera in Paradise returns for its second edition, buoyed by the sold-out crowd and magnificent reception for its inaugural edition last year. This year, the roster of artistes includes returning musical director and flautist Andrea Griminelli, along with multi-album mezzo-soprano Laura Wright, awardwinning soprano Cathy-Di Zhang, and celebrated tenor John Longmuir, who has performed more than 500 times for Opera Australia.

At last year's Opera in Paradise, musical director Andrea Griminelli remembers his very first trip to Pangkor Laut Resort back in 1994, when he travelled there as part of the musician ensemble to the late Luciano Pavarotti. At the time, when asked on his first encounter with the private island resort of Pangkor Laut Resort, Pavarotti, one of the legendary Three Tenors, exclaimed: "This place is enchanting, it is paradise here. This morning when I woke up, I went out and I was really moved, almost crying to see how beautiful things has been done by God – because this is really paradise."

In the intervening years, Griminelli would continue visiting Pangkor Laut Resort on his sojourns into Asia. "I came again in 2002 with Pavarotti when he inaugurated the spa, and I've probably been here between eight and 10 times." So, when the idea for Opera in Paradise was conceived, Griminelli remembers wondering what it would be like, being the

musical director of an opera set within a tropical island instead of a concert hall. "It was an honour when I was asked because of the relationship I enjoy with the YTL family," he says.

Dato' Mark Yeoh, YTL Corporation's Executive Director, remembers being in Modena – the birthplace of Pavarotti – and reflecting on his own family's memories of Pavarotti. "We used to visit Luciano there. And, of course, I called Andrea to become the music director for Opera in Paradise."

Thus Opera in Paradise – a tribute to Pavarotti and also intended to benefit Hospis Malaysia – made perfect sense to Griminelli. "God gives us talents and we have to give back," he says, "and to remember Pavarotti as well at this island resort that is rich with his legacy." (The resort's highest-tier accommodation is named The Pavarotti Suite.)

Having worked with him at more than 200 concerts around the world, Griminelli likens Pavarotti to a father. "I remember him asking me, when I was a young musician, to join him for a concert – I was just studying in Paris then." To many, Pavarotti was a myth. Griminelli, however, possesses an enduring memory of the maestro's great generosity. "He loved a lot of people and was always generous with his advice. He even ordered a gold flute for me."


It's no wonder, then, that the wheels quickly whirred into motion for the inaugural edition of Opera in Paradise. Thanks to Griminelli's global renown, he was able to assemble a star lineup comprising American tenor Michael Austin, who is











known for his starring role in Verdi's Othello, as well as Belle Voci (Italian for 'beautiful voices'), a soprano duo from the UK who featured on the live finals of *The Voice UK* and also performed at the 2019 FA Cup Final at Wembley Stadium.

Emily Burnett and Sophie Rowland, who make up Belle Voci, comments: "It's just bizarre that our voices brought us somewhere as idyllic as this – we just can't stop smiling." During soundcheck, Burnett and Rowland observed that amid the melody of string quintet and the piano, the rhythmic waves added 'another level' to their performance that they couldn't believe.

Austin, whose his life-long career began as a five-year-old singing in church, describes his first-ever visit to Pangkor Laut Resort in much the same way as Pavarotti did. "You see a paradise when looking at the beautiful waters, the greenery and the people here, who are so nice." The tenor, who fancies a game of golf or chess in between work, says the greatest gift that music has given him is humility. "If you really study the literature of all the composers, and really understand it, it makes you a better human being. These were brilliant people and they knew what they were doing – and I'm thankful every day for the lessons that we are still learning through their music, especially given the state of the world today."

Throughout the Opera in Paradise programme, guests enjoyed the many charms of Pangkor Laut Resort, from a 'Pasar Malam Night' welcome dinner, which recalls the flavours and aromas of nearby Ipoh city's street food scene, to scenic cocktails at Fisherman's Cove, overlooking the Strait of Malacca.


At Samudera, the resort's al fresco gazebo, and against a rock face, the inaugural Opera in Paradise went into full swing with Griminelli launching into a repertoire of Bizet, Morricone, Puccini's *O Mio Babbino Caro*, and *Czardas* by Vittorio Monti, among others. Of note was Austin's rendition of *O Paradiso*, harking back to Pavarotti's evocative description of the resort.

Then, a stirring trio of songs by Belle Voci with Flower Duet, Nessun Dorma and Time to Say Goodbye, before Griminelli and Austin brought up the rear with O Sole Mio. The final song for the evening, Verdi's Brindisi, even saw a rainbow colour the horizon, which prompted Griminelli to quip that Pavarotti himself was smiling on, and approved of, the proceedings.

An opera gala dinner that followed at Feast Village also included the Pavarotti Pasta, reconstructed by the kitchen team from notes found in the 1988 Metropolitan Opera cook book (in which Pavarotti contributed two recipes – both for pasta). For mains, the King's Medallion of roasted wagyu and shaved truffle recalled the repeated requests by the present-day King Charles III at Pangkor Laut Resort during his 2017 official tour of Malaysia. To conclude, opera cake was served as dessert, a French classic popularised in the mid-century as a tribute to the Paris opera.

Reflecting on the inaugural Opera in Paradise, Griminelli says: "I'm very moved because I see so many friends here – people I've known for so long. And for us to do a concert every year here – it gives me a kind of happiness, and I'm excited to bring the best musicians and the best singers to this paradise."

f the real meaning of travel is to live and breathe as the locals do, then a real beach vacation should involve nothing less. Get to know the critters and creatures of the sand and sea on your next beach holiday at Tanjong Jara Resort, where kaleidoscopes of fish paint the underwater scene a myriad of colours, just as the turtles meet and greet visitors both on land and in the water.

In and around the island of Tenggol, just a stone's throw away from the resort, many stunning dive sites await both serious divers as well as casual snorkellers. The smooth currents of Tanjung Api make for great drift-diving along sheer underwater walls adorned with splashes of brightly coloured soft and hard corals, while the soft tree corals of Batu Tokong Kamudi set a bed of delight for sea anemones and nudibranchs. More leisurely dives of a shallower nature can be found at the rocky outcrop of Tokong Timur, which bursts into life with schooling fish, thanks to its nutrientrich waters, as well as Nyireh Point, where large bumphead parrotfish can be sighted along with the lovable pufferfish. In high season, divers may even spot whale sharks – gentle giants that can measure up to 18m in length – languidly gliding near the surface of Tenggol.

Depending on your luck, the graceful sight of a sea turtle soaring through the waters may or may not greet you. But don't be disappointed if one isn't on your dive logbook; there's a second chance to spot them on land.

On the sandy stretch of beach near the resort, turtlenesting walks welcome guests of all ages. Just a short stroll from the resort, Dungun beach stretches out as a protected beach, where, between May and September, green turtles come ashore to lay eggs. Terengganu is famously known as the 'Land of Turtles' and it keeps to its reputation to this day. The warm, grainy sand and the gentle slope of this particular stretch make it relatively easy for the turtles to negotiate their way across.

To keep the eggs from harm, they are retrieved by authorities from the nest and reburied in warm sand in a safely guarded hatchery – a step unfortunately now necessary because it remains legal to eat turtle eggs, driving up their demand. If you stay at Tanjong Jara Resort, your chances of being part of a turtle's cycle of life, from nesting and hatching to release and inevitable return, are exclusively high.

# CLASSIC HIGHLANDS FEAST

SAVOUR THE BEST OF THE NEW GREAT HIGHLANDS ROAST MENU WITH JUICY ROASTED LAMB LEG, FRESH LOCAL VEGETABLES AND CLASSIC ENGLISH DISHES AT CAMERON HIGHLANDS RESORT.

aving evolved from a hill station during colonial times, Cameron Highlands did not gain significant attention until 1925, when British governor Sir George Maxwell documented its discovery, subsequently drawing expatriates and planters who recognised the potential of its fertile mountain slopes for growing tea. Perched 1,500m above sea level amidst a forested mountainscape, Cameron Highlands Resort is a picturesque plateau matched by its cool climate, greenway trails and flower beds.

To revisit the traditional English customs in this cottage-styled mountain retreat, the resort has introduced a new menu called The Great Highlands Roast. Held every Saturday at the Dining Room, this dinner feast centres around a succulent roast lamb leg sourced from the hills of Darling Downs, Australia. The lamb is marinated with fragrant herbs before being slow roasted at medium heat for one hour. "This process tenderises the meat and locks in the juices, which gives it a nice, even char," says chef Mohan Deligannu, corporate executive chef of YTL Hotels.

This four-course menu begins with a choice of either mossy forest salad or chicken liver pâté with mango chutney, leafy greens and toasted bread. The former is a nod to the nearby mossy forest, where guests can embark on calming hikes and treks through a nature paradise reminiscent of the movie *Avatar*. Local herbs and greens form the base of this salad, with watercress, locally harvested mushrooms and cherry tomatoes, topped with balsamic vinaigrette. A sesame feta cheese cigar adds a crispy finishing touch to the salad.

Next on the menu is a sweet corn chowder, with the main spotlight on the region's well-favoured Pearl corn that is known for its salient natural sweetness. To prepare the chowder, the corn is boiled with the husk to fully extract its rich flavours into a stock. The kernels are then removed and sauteed with onions, garlic and leeks. After incorporating butter and flour to create a velouté, this mixture is combined with the corn stock, pureed with cream and served with golden-brown croutons on top.

For the mains, guests can choose from two meat options or a vegetarian dish. The highland vegetable Wellington

Residing within this business hotel is the AC Lounge, an ergonomic space for guests to work, collaborate







ver at Jalan Kamunting, Kuala Lumpur, sits Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur. The hotel perfectly exemplifies the unique blend of contemporary design and traditional charm of its surrounding neighbourhood. Its distinctive feature is its brick façade, where 120,000 pieces of bricks were specially moulded to be mounted horizontally without using mortar or cement. Throughout the building, horizontal bands are interspersed to frame the progression of the brick screening, resulting in a 'stripes' effect, which gave the hotel its distinct name.

Besides being a unique piece of architecture, this design also pays homage to the rich history of the surrounding neighbourhood, one of the oldest in Kuala Lumpur. In the days of old, Jalan Kamunting was the main settlement for tin mining during the colonial era. At the end of the 19th century, a devastating flood and fire destroyed the early settlements, which had been mostly constructed from wood and thatch. Following this, most of the buildings were replaced with 'brick and tiles' as stipulated by the British colonial administration.

The piece of land on which Hotel Stripes currently stands eventually became YTL Corporation's very first office and headquarters. In 2017, this was transformed into the current hotel, the second Autograph Collection hotel in Malaysia within the Marriott International portfolio. After the pandemic, the area has since blossomed into a lively and vibrant hub but, only seven years ago, it was still a quiet street with a smattering of 1940s shophouses and decadesold family-owned businesses.

One such establishment is Yut Kee Restaurant, which

is now run by third-generation owner Mervyn Lee, with his father Jack occasionally helping him. Long queues can be seen outside the restaurant at most times, which serves traditional Hainanese dishes such as stir-fried Hailam Mee and Kaya Roll.

Jack, who turns 80 soon, says: "Our restaurant was established in 1928, and it was moved from its former premises at Jalan Dang Wangi to the unit next door in 2014. I grew up in our current unit at No.1, Jalan Kamunting. We were the first unit here to commercialise. When we acquired both units, we restarted the restaurant in 2014. In fact, the late Tan Sri Dato' Seri Yeoh Tiong Lay, the founder of YTL Corporation, dined at our shop 10 days before he passed away.

"When Hotel Stripes came up, this was still a residential area," Jack continues. "It has definitely gotten busier in the past few years, which is good for all the residents here."

Another living treasure of the area is Loke Kwong Yuen, a dapper gentleman with perfectly coiffed silver locks and the second-generation owner of Ah Loke Tailor. He has continued his father's legacy of being one of the most reputable tailors in the Klang Valley for decades. The 'sifu' (or master) has

dressed notable figures, including Bob Hawke, former prime minister of Australia; Tun Dr. Mahathir Mohamad; and boxer Joe Bugner.

"I've been here for more than 50 years already. I learned the trade from my father," Loke says. "In recent years, the neighbourhood has become more developed with more people renting as it is quite near the city centre."

Sitting alongside these old-school businesses is a plethora of modern eateries to dine in, offering cuisines such as Japanese, Western, contemporary Chinese, and authentic Italian. Many locals and international tourists can been seen frequenting these establishments to whet their appetites and to populate their social media. And thanks to a delightful selection of cafes in the area, the corporate crowd and digital nomads have also made the neighborhood a second office.

Another notable addition is the reincarnation of The Row, formerly known as the Asian Heritage Row. Here, a total of 22 pre-war shophouses feature an amalgamation of great restaurants, dazzling nightlife, cafés, and creative businesses. For instance, visitors can shop for eclectic designer household pieces at Haus or customise their bicycles at The Bike Artisans. Opposite sits a cutting-edge boutique Neo, which offers effortlessly chic monochrome pieces for all genders.

A stone's throw away, is the Loke Mansion, the former residence of the late tin tycoon Loke Yew, which is an amalgamation of Dutch, Malay, and Chinese architectural styles. Its exterior is a magnificent sight to behold. Then, hop on a taxi to nearby Jalan Tuanku Abdul Rahman, which is a veritable textile haven. Here, shoppers hunt for bargain deals for traditional wear that are available in a plethora of colours.

Due to the hotel's proximity to the heart of Kuala Lumpur,


the marvels of the city landscape can also be experienced here, including a postcard-worthy shot of the Petronas Twin Towers by standing at the intersection of Jalan Kamunting and Jalan Yap Ah Shak. For unobstructed dazzling views of the KL Tower, ride the elevator to the rooftop of Man Tao Bar at Hotel Stripes Kuala Lumpur, where you can sip on cocktails and nibble on yakitori.

The hotel is also home to other mouthwatering dining experiences such as a quintessential English Afternoon Tea derived from sister hotel, The Academy London, with a delightful Asian twist. teeped in ritualistic theatrical arts and meditative practices, Spa Village Resort Tembok, Bali stands as a sacred sanctuary on the island's northeastern tip, near the village of Desa Tembok in Tejakula. Despite its quietude, a gentle vitality permeates this part of Bali, where soaring peaks cascade down grassy lowlands and black volcanic sands meet the blue Bali Sea. Beyond standard spa treatments, the resort's integrated approach to wellness includes intentional activities, purposeful living and nutritious dining.

The resort's architectural design combines understated Western influences with Balinese aesthetics, blending natural Balinese timber with neutral fabrics and native touches. Each accommodation – the Kamar Room, the Surya and Purnam

#### WATER ACTIVITIES



CELEBRATE JANE AUSTEN'S
25OTH ANNIVERSARY NEXT YEAR
IN GRAND FASHION AT
THE GAINSBOROUGH BATH SPA.

t is a truth universally acknowledged, that a single man in possession of a good fortune, must be in want of a wife." This first line from Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* is one of the most famous openings to a novel in literary history. It establishes at the start of the book the importance of an advantageous marriage in Regency England. In 2025, literary buffs, and fans of Regency society and Austen film adaptations will celebrate the 250th anniversary of her birth. Although these celebrations will take place all over the world, there really is only one place to fete Jane Austen and that is at The Gainsborough Bath Spa in the fashionable city of Bath.

For six days and five nights in April 2025 (from the 7 to the 12) and again in October 2025 (from the 13 to the 18), there is to be an advantageous marriage between Strictly Jane Austen Tours and The Gainsborough Bath Spa for guests who have booked in advance and are the lucky few to experience



the immersive bespoke celebrations of Austen's birth year. This is the best sort of marriage of luxurious convenience, celebrated over six days of curated amusements. Austen herself once wrote: "One cannot have too large a party. A large party secures its own amusement."

The author and her family lived in Bath from 1801 to 1806 and, in her novels, she often satirised the social scene of balls, assemblies and promenades. Her father and brother Thomas also took the healing thermal waters at Cross Bath. The Gainsborough Bath Spa, which is a five-minute walk away from Cross Bath, has its own private spa for its guests today that taps into the city's natural thermal springs. It is no wonder that the protagonist Catherine Morland in *Northanger Abbey* says: "I really believe I shall always be talking of Bath when I am home again."

For the Austen celebrations next year, if you would like to immerse yourself even more in the refined customs of the times and dress up in Regency period costume, you are welcome to bring your own, or apply (for an extra charge) to the Austen tour organisers ECT Travel to hire one or several different outfits for you. These will be delivered to The Gainsborough Bath Spa hotel in time for your arrival.

Some of the many celebration highlights include a private visit to No 1 Royal Crescent Museum, one of city's most recognisable Georgian architectural landmarks. No 1 was the first house to be built on the Crescent and was where Austen often walked to when her family lived on Gay Street.

A visit to the Whitchurch Silk Mill, a 19th-century water mill that weaves English silk fabrics using 19th-century machinery, tells the story of Austen's interest in the dress and fashion of the times. Far from being a dowdy spinster, Austen's 161 known letters reveal a woman who was a keen observer of style, and whose thrifty characters reuse and

repurpose clothing to keep up with fashion. You will also visit Chawton House, an Elizabethan manor house that once belonged to Austen's brother Edward and which Austen referred to as the 'Great House' in her letters. Edward offered the bailiff's cottage nearby to his mother and sisters, Jane and Cassandra. This is now the Jane Austen House Museum, which is also on your celebration itinerary, and is where the author enjoyed the most prolific phase of her writing life.

These entertaining visits are interspersed with workshops hosted in a former chapel at The Gainsborough Bath Spa. These 'jovial and illuminating experiences' include a Regency dance class replete with a caller, piper music and

dance helpers, as well as an embroidery workshop, where needlewoman Alison Larkin will teach you to stitch a sprig. Several sumptuous feasts prepared with a Regency-theme by the head chef of the hotel is also on the cards.

As Jane Austen herself once wrote: "It's such happiness when good people get together."

# A ROOM WITH A ROOFGARDEN VIEW



o borrow and adapt a line from E.M. Forster's A Room with a View, "One doesn't come to [Edinburgh] for niceness, one comes for life."

Although small compared to London (population 9.7 million), Edinburgh, with a population of slightly more than 550,000, is considered one of the world's leading festival cities. Each summer, there are eight festivals happening at once, not to mention the Storytelling Festival in the autumn and the Edinburgh Hogmanay to usher in the New Year in December.

Families and film buffs come in May and June for the Edinburgh International Children's Festival and the Edinburgh International Film Festival. Founded in 1947, the latter was the UK's first international film festival and was originally focused on documentary filmmaking. Today, it hosts Hollywood stars and world premieres.

In July, music and art lovers are spoilt for choice during the 10 days of the Edinburgh Jazz & Blues Festival, with more than 170 concerts crammed into a packed schedule. The Edinburgh Art Festival, which also takes place in July, attracts more than 250,000 visitors each year, making it the UK's largest annual celebration of visual art.

As summer rolls into its twilight in the month of August, the festival circuit moves up another gear altogether, hosting three separate mega events. In the space of just three weeks, the Edinburgh Fringe Festival sells around 2.3 million tickets for more than 50,000 performances of about 3,500 theatre, dance, comedy, opera, music and cabaret shows.

Meanwhile, The Edinburgh International Festival's roots go right back to the post-war era, as Europe looked to forge a brighter future through artistic inspiration and expression. The festival brings together artists and organisations from across the globe to present an annual programme of music, dance, theatre and opera in the major theatres and grand halls of the Scottish capital.

Perhaps the most spectacular of them all is the annual Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo that takes place at the historic Edinburgh Castle Rock. The Tattoo has never had a cancelled performance since its inception in 1950, and sells out its entire 220,000 ticket allocation each and every year. Although 100 million people also watch it each year on television screens around the world, there's nothing quite like being there yourself.


If you are looking for a more chilled August experience, we recommend the Edinburgh International Book Festival. In

a tented village created each year, visitors will find an oasis of calm, where book lovers rub shoulders with world-famous authors. Book festival ticket holders often can be seen taking a break in the sunshine on a deckchair, nursing a drink in one hand and a favourite book in the other.

As the population of Edinburgh doubles in August, when visitors from across the world come to the city, the ideal way to enjoy these shows and entertainment is to stay at The Glasshouse Autograph Collection hotel in the city centre. This five-star property is that rare gem in a city hotel, a lushly planted rooftop garden that offers sweeping views of the UNESCO site, Calton Hill, and is the perfect calming oasis amidst the excitement of the festivals.

Out of the 77 rooms at The Glasshouse, 51 have direct access to an outdoor space in the form of either the rooftop garden or a terrace. From May to September, the Rooftop Bar collaborates with The Botanist on a summer menu of cocktails. Hotel guests also have a choice of outdoor yoga or Pilates sessions in the garden. If you have more ambitious events in mind, The Glasshouse team can help you plan anything, from an al fresco wedding ceremony to a rooftop summer barbecue social in the garden. The hotel enjoys an enviable location in Edinburgh, with the Picardy Place tram stop opposite the property. It is only a few minutes' walk from Edinburgh Waverley train station, while the lively St James Quarter is but a stone's throw away from The Glasshouse.

t the heart of Monkey Island Estate in Bray is the dignified statue of the late Tan Sri Dato' Seri Yeoh Tiong Lay, seated under the shade of a tree. Years ago, something about the islet property touched his imagination, and he had the foresight to purchase the estate on a visit to the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead. His statue now looks out peacefully towards the river.

More than 200 years ago, Monkey Island caught the eye of someone else who possessed equal foresight. It was the 17-year-old Honourable Charles Spencer, who had, at that time, neither inherited the title of Duke of Marlborough nor Blenheim Palace yet. What he saw was a fish-shaped island on the Thames, built on rubble from the Great Fire of London. Even at that young age, Lord Spencer knew he would need a retreat from the cares of the world one day and, in 1723, commissioned Palladian architect Robert Morris to create two new buildings on the island. These are now the Grade I-listed Temple and Pavilion of Monkey Island Estate.

It is in the former billiard room of the Temple that we have the most exclusive, jaw-dropping accommodation in Maidenhead, which is known as The Wedgewood Suite. Two years after Spencer acquired the island, he engaged Thomas Roberts of Oxford to decorate the suite. Roberts used intricate ivory jasperware plasterwork that he sculpted into mythical sea creatures.

When YTL Hotels purchased the property, it underwent 18 months of meticulous renovation to turn it into a splendid luxury hotel. Monkey Island Estate opened in the summer of 2019 and bookings for The Wedgwood Suite started to flow in, as did rave reviews. Carefully preserved was the fine ceiling, with the god Neptune, seashells and mermaids in classic blue and white Wedgwood, which is definitely the singular feature of this suite.

Guests at Monkey Island Estate can also book pampering treatments at the Floating Spa, quirkily housed on a cobalt-blue barge on the water that rocks soothingly when other boats pass. It's a truly unique space for decompressing – but it closes once a year for maintenance, so check before you book. Transport options to get to this unique property includes mooring for yachts. Would you expect anything less from the jewel in the crown of YTL Hotels' UK properties?

# SOFT FEMININE POWER IN BLOOMSBURY

TAKE A HISTORICAL WALK FROM THE ACADEMY HOTEL THROUGH 200 YEARS OF BRITISH ARTS AND SCIENCES.

he Academy Hotel is a quintessentially Bloomsbury property, a member of the exclusive stable of Small Luxury Hotels group and perfectly situated between a neighbourhood rich in British history and the world-famous West End theatre district in London. Within three blocks of The Academy Hotel are landmarks of remarkable British women from the past 200 years. They span the arts, medicine, space travel, politics, the suffrage movement and espionage. We recommend this self-guided walking tour from the 50-room, 240-year-old Georgian property the next time you check into the bijou address.

Start at Heal's on Tottenham Court Road to remember Lucienne Day (1917-2010), the 20th century textile designer who lit up postwar British homes because she believed that good things should have an affordable price tag. Lady Ottoline Morrell (1873-1938), at 44 Bedford Square, is famous for sponsoring, and bedding, many Bloomsbury artists. She was first cousin to the late Queen Mother and the inspiration for DH Lawrence's Lady Chatterley.

The rallying cry of suffrage leader Dame Milicent Garrett Fawcett (1847-1929), who lived at 2 Gower Street, was "Courage calls to courage everywhere!" Meanwhile, Fanny Eaton (1835-1924), Britain's most visible Victorian woman of colour and an icon of mixed heritage beauty, is associated with the Pre-Raphaelite studio on 7 Gower Street. She was the muse and model for artists like Rossetti and Millais. Nearby is Malet Street and Birkbeck University, whose alumni include Dr Helen Sharman (born 1963), the first British astronaut and first woman to visit the Mir space station in May 1991.

Gordon Square Gardens is associated with British secret agent Noor Inayat Khan (1914-1944), who assisted the French resistance and contributed to the success of the D-Day landings. Descended from Indian royalty, Noor was eventually captured and killed.

In 1963, at the corner of Gower Street and Euston Road, superstar photographer Fiona Adams (1935-2020) took one of the defining images of 20th-century culture. It was a picture of four young men in dark suits jumping in the air, which would become the iconic cover of The Beatles' Twist & Shout album. Artist Gwen John (1876-1939) lived at 21 Fitzroy Street. She was a pupil of Whistler, an admirer of Cézanne and lover of Rodin, but was famous for her paintings of solitary women in quiet interiors.

In July 1913, Vanessa Bell (1979-1961) founded the Omega Workshops at 33 Fitzroy Square, famous for producing bold printed fabrics and textiles, ceramics, furniture and clothing. Her sister, Virginia Woolf, resided nearby at 29 Fitzroy Street.

Five of these accomplished nine women are linked to the Bloomsbury set, whose aesthetics and history are so much a part of the signature style of The Academy Hotel. Lady Ottoline Morrell, Dame Millicent Fawcett and Vanessa Bell were all acquainted with one another and visited each other's homes in the vicinity of the hotel. We recommend spending a quiet hour at the hotel's Alchemy Bar, nursing a cocktail and leafing through one of the Bloomsbury novels in the lounge to remember this remarkable constellation of talent by.






#### 3. MEDITERRANEAN WARMTH




#### 8. WALL-TO-WALL ART



where a cool sea breeze meets those who had managed this far. The run is a colourful spectacle, with a strong charitable aspect further enhancing a lively atmosphere.



# Q&A:

## MOTOKAZU YONEZAWA

THE AFFABLE CHEF, KNOWN TO HIS FRIENDS AND FAMILY
AS CHEF MOKA, SHARES WHAT HE LOVES ABOUT
NISEKO VILLAGE AND WHY YOU SHOULD VISIT IT SOON.

## Please tell us about your new restaurant Moka in Niseko Village.

Tourists from all over the world visit Niseko, so I have been able to serve my own original Italian cuisine to people from all over the world at Moka. This experience has allowed me to learn about their food preferences and values as well. I am also grateful for the opportunity to serve dishes made with ingredients from Niseko as well as various regions of Malaysia by working together with YTL. Many of the employees have been working for the group for a long time, and I have the impression that there is a strong sense of stability in YTL.

## What is your favourite thing about Niseko and why should guests visit Moka and Niseko Village?

I recommend Niseko because it's a place with clean air, beautiful views, and high-quality water and ingredients, while Niseko Village has plenty of well-equipped facilities and a frequent shuttle bus service, which makes it so convenient for guests.

A lot of my dishes are made using ingredients from Niseko as well as the rest of Hokkaido. I'd say that my cuisine is a 'marriage' of ingredients and unique flavours, which uses seasonings and cooking methods to bring out the best of each ingredient, and create a beautifully balanced dish and a taste that lingers in the mouth. I'm also very particular about cooking and meat preparation methods, to ensure that the meat and food we serve is juicy, tender and safe to eat. And I'm also a professional sommelier, so guests can savour our dishes with wine and sake pairings.

# You and your wife Noriko have been in Malaysia for many years. What's unique about Malaysians and their love of Japanese cuisine and culture?

It seems to me that because Malaysia is a country with a lot of multiracial diversity, we need to serve and also adjust the dishes we create depending on their culture and to match their preferences. But I think that, over the years, Malaysians' love for Japanese food and culture has barely changed at



all. However, I've noticed that the number of Japanese food ingredients and seasonings available in Malaysian supermarkets has increased, and it seems that Japanese food culture is becoming more and more popular.

## Finally, could you please explain the spirit of *omotenashi* and why it's so important in Japanese culture and cuisine?

Omotenashi is the highest level of taking care of our guests, and showing them our very best attention, consideration and thoughtfulness. I think that ometenashi is very important in Japanese culture because many Japanese people have it in their DNA. It values the spirit of harmony in terms of communicating with one another, instead of thinking of eating as merely a means of maintaining health or supplying energy for living.



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
